Tech Trek Summer Camp for Seventh Grade Girls Comes to New Mexico for the Fifth Year!

Participants were nominated by their science or math teacher. Students completed an application and interview process before final selections were made in early April. Cost for the camp was only \$50 per student, as the program is funded by AAUW-NM as well as by New Mexico businesses and individuals.

Sixty five girls were chosen from across the state of New Mexico to attend the camp. They gained first-hand knowledge of real world applications of STEM in a fun-filled, hands-on college environment. Campers participated in one of five core classes each day and in hands-on field trips and workshops to expose them to several STEM fields. Core classes were: A Tour of the Stellar Cycle of Life (Astronomy); App Creators (Computer Science;, Girl Powered Robot! (Robotics); Gear Girls—A Motorized Toy Challenge (Mechanical Engineering); and Forensics (Chemistry). Campers also interviewed women in STEM fields at the Professional Women's Banquet Wednesday evening. More information is located at: http://TechTrek-NM.aauw.net.

The camp builds on AAUW's research report <u>Why So Few? Women in Science</u>, <u>Technology, Engineering and Math</u> which identifies camps like Tech Trek as increasing girls' interests in STEM fields. Girls benefit greatly from exposure to STEM role models, knowing that they too can excel in these fields.

Funding was provided by private donations, including those of many AAUW members. There were donations from Sandia National Laboratories, New Mexico Public Education Department, Honeywell, Raytheon, Virgin Galactic, El Paso Electric, Walmart and Los

Alamos National Laboratory Foundation.

October Meeting

Forty-four members and guests attended the October 6 meeting. There were a number of positive comments about the new location at Tanoan Community Building. The remarks included, cozy, able to hear speakers, and members and guests were visiting more easily.

At the October board meeting there were suggestions on how to arrange the room to create more space for seating.

Speaker Dede Feldman presented an interesting and challenging talk. Dede served in the New Mexico Senate for 16 years. Her experience as a legislator influenced her to write a book, Another Way Forward: Grassroots Solutions from New Mexico. She presented examples of grassroots groups that are solving problems in New Mexico. These groups are changing New Mexico from the bottom up. The stories she shared demonstrated how local communities have pulled together local talent and resources to improve the quality of life for their citizens. She discussed development of programs for new types of health care workers which has increased the effectiveness of health care in underserved areas. Programs for youth have connected them to New Mexico's natural environment. Participants developed skills that prepared them for work in and/or prepared them for professional education in forestry and related environmental occupations. She talked about job development organizations that support economic improvement in low income areas. Another program supported low-income youth to enroll in higher education. One of the most interesting projects she talked about was Meow Wolf in Santa Fe that has developed a creative way to develop a new type of economic enterprise with a wide ranging impact.

Dede's presentation generated many questions and a lively discussion. Members shared information about local organizations that are working to improve the quality of life in Albuquerque and New Mexico. If you were unable to attend her presentation, consider purchasing her book.

The Traveling Library

The Traveling Library provides an opportunity for members to read current books without having to attend any meetings! The Traveling Library is under the aegis of the Current Literature Interest Group. The Traveling Library has been an AAUW group since the 1930s. Members pay \$20 each for the opportunity to read 12-15 recent books during a year. Anyone who joins can help with the selection of books.

Members submit potential selections to Sheila Richmond between December 1 and the date of the selection meeting in February. Books are current, within the past two years. Members send a review of a book they are recommending to Sheila. This year the selection meeting will be February 12. At the meeting members will discuss and vote on selections for the coming year.

Once there is a decision on the books, Sheila orders two copies of each book. She organizes a routing system for the books. In April, at the meeting of the Current Literature Interest Group, members can pick up their first book. On or about the 15th of each month the member will deliver a book to the next person on the routing list. Another member will deliver a new book to you!

There are typically twenty two to twenty four members. Two routing lists are developed. Members will deliver the last book for the year in March 2020. At the April 2020 meeting the last book will be turned in.

The benefits are great: lots of good current books; about evenly divided between fiction and non-fiction; for the cost of only \$20 for the whole year; and a chance to help choose books. Someone else buys and wraps the books for distribution and you are welcome to join in discussion at the end of the year. The books can be purchased by members at the April meeting for a nominal price. Books that are not purchased are donated to local libraries.
