"Inside the New Mexico Legislature"

Elinor Rushforth, Senior Attorney Southwest Women's Law Center (SWLC) and **Elena Rubenfeld**, Attorney at the UNM Office of Equal Opportunity will share their experiences advocating for New Mexico's women and their families and preview the 2019 Legislative Session.

In 2018, Elinor and Elena led Southwest Women's Law Center efforts to pass House Bill 189: Pregnant Worker's Accommodation Act which was priority legislation for AAUW NM Lobby Corps. SWLC will reintroduce legislation to improve workplace conditions for pregnant women, as well as, legislation supporting paid family and medical leave. Because both issues directly impact economic security for women, they will be a priority for AAUW NM Lobby Corps. As a bonus, Elena will update us on the U.S. Department of Education's proposed changes in Title IX regulations which AAUW vigorously opposes.

Margret Wente & Janet Matwiyoff Honored with 50 Year Memberships

Janet (Jan) Helen Hogberg Matwiyoff

Jan was born in Chicago. Her family soon moved to Pittsburgh when World War II started. Her father was a blast furnace expert and worked in the steel industry. When her father was transferred to Michigan, they settled in Dearborn where Jan completed high school. In her junior year Jan was an American Field Service Exchange student in New Zealand. She says, "It shaped my life. It created a fierce independence in me."

Both of Jan's parents were college graduates. Her mother taught nursery school but her health was a factor in their lives. Jan's father helped to rebuild the steel industry in Europe after the war. Jan attended the University of Michigan with majors in History and French. She spent her junior year in Sweden, from which her father's family had immigrated from.

After graduation from college, Jan married Nick Matwiyoff, who she met in high school. They maintained a relationship for seven years.

Nick's degrees were in chemistry. He was involved in the early development of the MRI. They spent time at Stanford and Pennsylvania State where Jan was a teaching assistant in the History Department. She was the first woman hired for that position. Jan and Nick moved next to Santa Fe, where Nick worked for over 20 years at the Los Alamos National Laboratory. His final years of work were as a neuroscientist at the University of New Mexico Medical School. Their son, Greg was born while they lived in Santa Fe. Jan involved herself in community work. She chaired the Santa Fe Centennial Celebration. She served as the first administrator of the Brunn School for four years. She also assisted Nick with organizational work at the UNM MRI Center where Nick educated physicians and scientists about the new MRI technology. Jan joined AAUW shortly after moving to Santa Fe. At that time AAUW had national study groups including one on the environment. After Earth Day 1972, Jan and others in AAUW worked with the city in developing a recycling program. After the kiosks were erected to collect recyclables, the AAUW members worked on how to find markets for glass, steel cans, and newspapers. Their motto was Garbage is not Glamorous.

Jan and Nick more to Albuquerque when Greg finished high school and began attending University of California at Santa Barbara. Jan was active in fund-raising for the AAUW Educational Foundation on the local and state level. She served as Branch President from 1996-1998. She made many innovations in our branch including the development of the 50-year history of the Albuquerque Branch.

Later, Jan's time was occupied by caring for Nick. After he passed, she entered a new phase of her life and is now back active in AAUW. She is currently serving as interim fund raising chair and supervising the calling committee and started the Fourth Tuesday Interest Group.

Jan spends as much time as she can with her son's family in San Diego. Greg is now a captain in the US Naval Medical Corp at Balboa Hospital. She has two grandchildren who are the light of her life.

Margaret (Meg) Wente

Meg Wente was born in the Belgium Congo, Africa. Her parents were missionaries sent by the Disciples of Christ, a U.S. protestant denomination. Her father was a medical doctor and her mother was a teacher. Meg was the second of four children. She was home-schooled for eight years when she lived in Africa.

She left Africa when she was 15 to live in Hiram, Ohio under the watchful eyes of relatives in a house that had belonged to her grandmother. Meg went on to Hiram College, graduating with a degree in History. After extra studies, she then became a teacher in a rural elementary school and later taught in Shaker Heights, Ohio. With four years' experience she was able to afford a trip to visit her parents in Congo. She taught for the U.S. military in England for one year. She left teaching to obtain a Master's Degree at Indiana University in Guidance and Counseling for elementary students.

When Meg was in a wedding party her future took a different turn. She met Hermann Wente and after a year they were married. Hermann worked at the Sandia Labs. Meg decided when she moved to New Mexico, to leave teaching to raise her children, Clara and Will.

Meg joined the Albuquerque Branch of AAUW in 1968 and took an active part in the Education Group. In 1984 the Education Forum of New Mexico was organized, and in time became the Coalition for Literacy, which exists today. She became active in the League of Women Voters and managed their office for twelve years. After Hermann died, Meg moved in 1913 to La Vida Llena, where she lives today. She is currently chair of the AAUW Current Literature group and is co-editor of LWV newsletter

The 46th anniversary of the Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision will be celebrated at the New Mexico capitol rotunda on January 22, 2019, 1-2 p.m.

The event is sponsored by a coalition of organizations including AAUW NM with NOW taking the lead. Several NM Senators and Representatives will attend. Our AAUW banner will be flying, and there will be cake.

HB51 Decriminalization of Abortion has been pre-filed by Representative Ferrary from

Las Cruces. The purpose of the bill is to repeal an outdated pre-*Roe v. Wade* statute criminalizing abortion in almost all circumstances. This bill is supported by AAUW NM. If you have decriminalization petitions, please mail them to Linda McDowell. The petition data will be taken to the Roundhouse on February 14 which is Coalition for Choice/Respect NM Women's pro-choice pro-family Lobby Day.

Registered voters residing in the Albuquerque School District will be mailed a ballot in January seeking a property tax increase to pay for renovating and repairing aging schools as well as updating security, technology, and educational equipment. AAUW members in New Mexico are being asked to use the form so that their activities related to legislation can be collected. Members will not be inundated with emails or required to do anything except what you wish to do. The form can be accessed at https://aauw-nm.aauw.net/policy/

Many members may feel they cannot participate in AAUW-NM Legislative efforts because they live far away from Santa Fe. This Lobby Corps effort will make it possible for all members to support AAUW-NM's advocacy work right from your arm chair by responding to action alerts, emailing the governor, representatives, senators, and/or committee members. You can also meet and talk to your elected officials right in your home town. You can also watch (active link on the form) committee meetings and floor sessions in the comfort of your home!

The form is a fillable PDF, and it has 3 active links embedded. Please download the file to your desktop, file, phone; anywhere you choose. Complete the form checking those things that you are willing to do (at the very least the action network 2-minute activist which is one of the active links.) There is also an active link to locate your district # for representatives and senators. Please fill those in.

(download the form, save the blank form to your desktop as AAUW-NM LC form with your initials and date, complete the form, and save it again, In some systems you must right click outside the form to save as.).
