Bonnie Rucobo, member of the Albuquerque Branch, talked about her experiences in working with children in four elementary schools in the North Valley and in and near Old Town. Poets in the Classroom was organized nine years ago. Last year, Bonnie accepted the responsibility of recruiting and organizing poets who share they love of poetry with students. Last year the poets reached 1200 children. Bonnie stated that forty poets participated this year and every poet showed up for their assigned class.

On display at the meeting were prints of six paintings in the collection at the Albuquerque Museum of Art and History. Bonnie serves as a docent at the museum. She talked the museum staff about the Poets in the Classroom program. Museum staff responded by offering to provide prints that students could use as inspiration for a poem. Bonnie read several of the poems written by the children. Her dream is to find funding to publish the poems in a book for each school that would be at a cost the families could afford. Bonnie's stories of the effect of Poet's in the Classroom on the children and their families were touching. What a wonderful gift of creativity this group of poets are giving children.

There are 127 applicants state wide for the 2019 Tech Trek Camp. Approximately half of the 58 Bernalillo County area applicants were interviewed March 16th. The remaining interviews will be on March 23rd. The Selection Committee will meet in April to select from the statewide applicants for sixty girls plus alternates for the Tech Trek Cam June 9-15 at New Mexico Tech in Socorro.

Nominating Committee Report

Janet Matiyoff, chair of the nominating committee reported to the Board of Directors that Ted Cooley, a longtime member has agreed to serve as Co-Vice President for Program and Rae Sporin, a new member, has agreed to serve as treasurer. Both candidates were asked to prepare a statement about themselves as a person and as a member of AAUW.

Introduction to Rae Lee Siporin

I am the first in my immediate family to go to college and as a result have always had a special value for the advantages higher education provides, especially to first generation students. And especially to female students. My professional life has been in higher education, starting as a full-time faculty member and working into full time administration. I've been the Academic Dean at a small private college in New England, Dean of General Studies at a smallish public college in New Jersey, Director of Planning at a large semipublic university and ended as the Director of

Undergraduate Admission at a large, highly selective public university on the west coast. So, I have experienced college across the country, in large and small, public and private institutions. During some of this time I continued to teach my favorite course, freshman writing.

While I have contributed financially to national AAUW for several years as part of my commitment to encourage and support women in higher education, this is the first time I have become involved at the local level. It seemed a logical next step in continuing my own growth in and support of women's issues. My professional experiences included supervising a program that worked to increase low income and underrepresented minority students going on to college. Thus, the STEM program is a natural for my hands-on commitment to young women. I have been very impressed with the monthly programs offered by the branch and look forward to meeting more members, attending the monthly presentations and to assisting where I can.

Ted Cooley

I am a retired Disciples of Christ pastor and I, also retired from the state of NM. My spouse Eleanor has been a life member AAUW since 1969, so when I retired in 2003, I joined AAUW. Shortly after retirement, I was co- president of the Albuquerque Branch for 4 years. I managed the state convention of "Women across Borders" with a speaker from Ciudad Chihuahua. I developed, led, and drove for senior hikers and am still hiking. I am active at Monte Vista Christian Church, an open and affirming congregation with gay and lesbian membership. Eleanor is still teaching for UNM Continuing Education in religious studies, with all the support I can give her.

Proposed Change in AAUW ABQ Bylaws And Policy and Procedures

AAUW- Albuquerque governance committee (Liz Gordon and Pat Maben) reviewed the bylaws and policies and procedures of the branch. On March21, the Board of Directors voted electronically to present the changes to the membership. On April 2, the recommendation to delete the bylaw that allows dues for new members joining between March 15 and July to be half price will be presented for a vote of the membership. AAUW national eliminated one half price dues for new members in March of 2018. Below is the proposed change for AAUW-Albuquerque Bylaws. There is also a change to clarify the time period for paying dues.

Article VIII. Branch Membership and Dues

Section 2 Branch Dues

- c. Member dues shall be payable as follows:
 - (1) Continuing Members pay Branch, AAUW-NM and AAUW National dues.
 - (2) Paid Life Members continue to pay Branch and AAUW-NM dues.
 - (3) Honorary Life Members are exempt from paying Branch and AAUW-NM dues.
 - (4) New members may join at any time. Dues are payable upon joining and shall be forwarded to AAUW immediately. The AAUW, AAUW-NM, and Branch portions of
- dues of dues paid by new members, joining between January 1 and March 15 shall
- be one half (1/2) the annual dues. This also applies to members who rejoin AAUW
 after an absence of two years or more
 - (5) Dues are payable on or before between March 15 and July 1 for the upcoming fiscal year.
