The Brain and Creativity

Rex Jung, Ph.D. professor of neurosurgery at the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center spoke at the April 6 meeting. Dr. Jung is a Neuropsychologist, brain imaging researcher, and a clinical professor of neurosurgery at the University of New Mexico. Through a PowerPoint presentation Dr. Jung reviewed the research he has conducted during the past 25 years about creativity and the brain.

He described creativity as the ability to produce something novel and useful. People who are creative develop lots of ideas. Some work, some do not. People who are considered to be have a

high intellect are usually competent in two areas. Example was Einstein was a physics genius and he also played the violin. Creativity is also found in persons with low intelligence.

He described ways an individual could increase their creativity through exercise, meditation, warm baths, long walks, and napping. Other activities include new experiences, travel, reading, and getting out of one's bubble.

Proposed changes to the Bylaws of the Albuquerque Branch

At the May meeting, members will be asked to approve changes in the Branch Bylaws. The Board of Directors voted unanimously to present the changes below to the membership. Items to be deleted are in red with cross out. Proposed changes are in green print.

ARTICLE VIII. BRANCH MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

- c. Member dues shall be payable as follows:
 - (1) Continuing Members pay Branch, AAUW-NM and AAUW National dues.
 - (2) Paid Life Members continue to pay Branch and AAUW-NM dues.
 - (3) Honorary Life Members are exempt from paying Branch and AAUW-NM dues.
 - (4) New members may join at any time. Dues are payable upon joining and shall be

forwarded to AAUW immediately.

- (5) Dues are payable on or before between March 15 and July 1 for the upcoming fiscal year.
- (6) Payment of additional dues shall be waived for a transferring member whose current dues have been paid to another branch.

ARTICLE IX. OFFICERS, NOMINATIONS, AND ELECTIONS

- **f.** The appointed officers of the Branch shall be appointed by the president upon the recommendation of the executive committee and with the majority approval of the Board. ARTICLE IX. OFFICERS, NOMINATIONS, AND ELECTIONS

Section 1. Officers.

- **f.** The appointed officers of the Branch shall be appointed by the president upon the recommendation of the executive committee and with the majority approval of the Board. Additional officers may be appointed as may be deemed necessary to carry on the work of the Branch. The schedule is: (1) In even-numbered years: i. b. Any directorship office to be filled by reason of an increase in the number of directors maybe may be filled by the Board of Directors for a term of office continuing only until the next election of directors.



Unprecedented efforts of more than twenty organizations, disinformation and unethical tactics were used by anti-choice advocates to defeat HB51 to decriminalize abortion from passing out of the Senate. Eight Democrats joined with Republican Senators to defeat HB51 when it reached the Senate floor. Five anti-choice bills were killed in committee hearings. HB89 Contraceptive Coverage was signed into law by the Governor on April 4. HB89 requires the provision of no cost six- month supplies of contraceptives and no cost

contraception for men (condoms and vasectomies). This aligns New Mexico's regulations with current federal law and provides consistent access to contraceptives if the federal regulations are revised or eliminated. Thanks to everyone who supported reproductive healthcare during the 2019 session of the New Mexico Legislature.

Tech Trek

The Selection Committee consisting of Helena Whyte, Justine Bayliss, Lorraine Garcia, Phyllis Ludi and Sylvia Fink met at Santa Fe Southside Library Saturday, April 6. Sixty potential campers and eight alternates were selected from the 130 applicants. Invitations were sent to the sixty-eight potential campers. Of the total applicants: one withdrew after interview, one never responded in order to interview, three did not show and would not reschedule.

The financial situation continues to be very good. We have received \$45,512 in corporate and government donations to date. Requests and expected other donations come to around \$45,000. We have \$66,829.18 in our Account. Core teachers have been hired and other staff have been interviewed.

The Tech Trek reunion was attended by 19 middle schoolers and 14 high schoolers. Twenty of the attendees were from the 2018 camp. Also, in attendance were seven Trek Tech mentors, Helena Whyte, 2018 Co-Director and current Tech Trek President from Los Alamos.
