News from National

AAUW has recently updated a number of useful advocacy resources on our website. Check out our updated Quick Facts on the <u>Paycheck Fairness Act</u>, <u>Equal Pay</u> and <u>Title</u> <u>IX</u>, as well as our numerous, updated <u>Know Your Rights at Work</u> and <u>Know Your Rights</u> <u>on Campus</u> legal advocacy resources. This is information that members should be sharing with the young women in their families and friends.

U.S. District Judge Tanya Chutkan <u>ruled in</u> late April that employers have until September 30, 2019, to report two years of pay data by sex, race and ethnicity to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). The district court admonished the administration for failing to immediately reinstate this critical equal pay protection, which the court had <u>previously held</u> was unlawfully halted. Today, the EEOC <u>announced</u> that it expects to begin collecting EEO-1 pay data for 2017 and 2018 in mid-July 2019. This data collection, which was halted by the Trump administration in 2017, will be used by the EEOC to better identify trends in pay discrimination.

Economic Security Task Force

Sylvia Fink will be initiating and chairing an Economic Security Task Force for the Albuquerque Branch. As you know this is a major strategic focus of AAUW. This Focus also ranked highly when we did our sticky note interest poll last fall. The Task Force will be publicizing the new online Work Smart and working on other issues pertinent to Economic Security as determined by the Task Force members. Prospective members will select the meeting time and place.

Democracy Dollars

ARE YOU TIRED OF BIG MONEY DECIDING OUR ELECTIONS?

Too many elections are often decided by a small group of secretive and rich political donors. They have all the power to decide who represents us, but it doesn't have to be that way. Democracy Dollars gives the power back to the people—at no extra cost to the taxpayer—by letting public candidates raise small contributions from regular people who normally wouldn't participate in funding campaigns. Today's candidates pay too much attention to wealthy donors and not enough to regular people.

Democracy Dollars/Burque Bucks

Democracy Dollars (Burque Bucks) will help to modernize the Albuquerque's current public financing program because they will ensure that participating candidates from all parts of the city can run competitive campaigns based on the strength of their local support, not the size of campaign contribution checks.

Democracy Dollars gives candidates the freedom (and the incentive) to walk out of that high-dollar fundraiser and come knock on your door—for a real conversation about what matters to you. Every year, fewer and fewer candidates take public financing: they know it's gotten harder to win under the current structure, letting big donors' voices dominate elections that should be determined by all of Albuquerque's voters.

Modeled after the Seattle Democracy Vouchers program, mayoral and city council candidates who qualify for public financing would have the opportunity to collect \$25 coupons from community members whom they seek to represent! The coupons are available to any federally recognized donor and are an important way for candidates to meet the people of their district, curb the influence of private money and corporate PACs and create a community donor class. All but one candidate in the 2017 city general election in Seattle ran with vouchers and small donations. This is a program that works.

The Albuquerque Democracy Dollars ballot initiative is well on its way to the November ballot. A steering committee, which consists of Center for Civic Policy, Common Cause New Mexico, Equality New Mexico, OLÉ and New Mexico Working Families Party has been working to ensure this initiative will be on the ballot.

Salary Negotiation Workshops/Economic Security

AAUW National has Work Smart online for free and has asked that we publicize this resource as much as possible. Coca-Cola has made the largest corporate donation ever with benchmarks of 14,000 per month, 100,000 by August 2019, and one million by 2022. So far, only 2000 have taken the beta test version currently on line.

Please help AAUW meet our goals! As a first step, please register for Work Smart Online, the free course that teaches women salary negotiation skills. We've updated it to make it easier to register and navigate. Even if the curriculum doesn't seem directly relevant to you, please take the class: we need our leaders to familiarize themselves with the material so they can serve as ambassadors in their communities for pay equity. Then, ask 20 contacts to take the tool. We need your help to train 100,000 women in Work Smart online by August.
