Climate Change

Dr. Katrina Bennett, PhD will be our speaker. She earned her PhD in Alaska at the University of Alaska Fairbanks, focused on the impacts of climate change on extreme events in boreal forest watersheds of interior Alaska. As a Los Alamos National Lab staff scientist, Katrina's work examines changes in the high latitude regions of the world, and in particular shifting hydrology and snow regimes in Alaska river basins. Katrina works on several major projects focused on Alaska's changing climate, and has spent significant time over the past 10 years living and working in Alaska watersheds, observing the changes that are ever present in this rapidly changing region of the globe.

Do not miss the opportunity to hear Dr. Bennett presentation about one of the most serious challenges of our day.

2020 Starts a New Decade – What at the New Challenges for Women?

For the past three years, the mantra has been 2020 will be the Year of the Woman. For decades women have been fighting for pregnancy accommodations, fair pay and the role as President of the United States. In 1972, Shirley Chisholm became the first woman to run for the position as President of the United States. Four decades and eight years later, other women have run for the office, but none have been elected, despite the voting strength of women across the country.

What other challenges are still facing women as we step into a new decade? We need look no further than the legislation pending in New Mexico to see the scope of challenges that women are still facing. Currently, 228 pieces of legislation have been pre-filed reflecting a broad range of topics, many of which affect the civil and social justice rights of women.

During 2020 legislative session, we will prioritize 10 bills that align with our National Public Policy Priorities. If you have not joined the Lobby Corp, please sign up today to be a part of the core committee that will review legislation and serve as the core team to help AAUW advance e legislation that supports the well-being of women, children and families.

The top five legislative priorities from the 228 bills that have been pre-filed in the New Mexico legislature are as follows:

- 1. SB 66 Services for Victims of Human Trafficking
- 2. HB 65 Funding Support for School Based Health Clinics
- 3. SB 13 Increasing Minimum Salaries for Special Education Teachers
- 4. SB 41 Public Awareness Campaign for Long Acting Reversible Contraceptives
- 5. HB 25 Pregnant Worker Accommodations

We will continue to watch the legislation filed in the House and Senate and provide the final recommendation of the top 10 legislative priorities for the 2020 Legislative Session. In order to ensure that we are most effective during the legislative session, we need every member of AAUW to identify their state representatives and senators and commit

to calling them at least two times during the legislation session, asking them to support the legislative priorities that AAUW identifies.

We will also be the guest of Representative Melanie Stansbury on the floor of the House of Representatives and have a picture opportunity with both Representative Stansbury and Brian Egolf, the Speaker of the House.

AAUW Tech Trek Camper Reunions: Since 2015, the Albuquerque Branch STEM Taskforce has hosted annual reunion events in Albuquerque for AAUW Tech Trek NM camper alumnae, inviting campers from all years, to a two-hour event we put together and hold on the UNM Campus in the Centennial Engineering Center. As the ages of our camper alumnae now span 13 thru 19 years old, this year we expanded and are holding one reunion for more recent alumnae and another one for older alumnae.

Recently, we held our older alumnae reunion on January 12 for those who attended camp in 2014, 2015 and 2016 (current juniors or seniors in high school and high school graduates). The format was an informal reconnecting and networking event at Saggio's Restaurant across from UNM campus. Pizza and drinks were provided and sixteen alumnae attended, including alumnae from the Albuquerque area, Laguna, Las Cruces, Carlsbad and Gallup. Alumnae caught up, met alumnae from other years and informally shared current and future plans with Albuquerque Branch STEM Taskforce members. We also provided handouts with current STEM internship and research opportunities for interested alumnae.

STEM Taskforce Handout: The STEM Taskforce maintains and updates a four-page handout with STEM out-of-school activities, clubs, internships and events. Our listing focuses on items that are mainly low to no cost for participants, are generally centered in the Albuquerque area and include, but are not limited to, items specifically for girls and young women. In January, we provided 150 handouts for one of our STEM partners, the "New Mexico Network for Women in Science & Engineering" (NMNWSE) for their annual Albuquerque "Expanding Your Horizons" (EYH) event held at the UNM campus on Jan 18th.. EYH in Albuquerque is an annual one-day event with the mission of

encouraging young women (grades 5-9) to pursue Science, Technology, Engineering and and Mathematics careers.

Discovery Festival 2019: On November 22nd the STEM Taskforce provided an interactive STEM Puzzle booth at the day long STEM festival hosted by Big Brothers Big Sisters at the Albuquerque Convention Center. This is our fourth year with a booth atthe event and STEM Taskforce members were kept busy all day helping over 1500 Albuquerque area K-12 students learn how to play and engage with the wide array of spatial and mathematical puzzles provided at our booth. Our booth also featured a poster display with information on AAUW and AAUW Tech Trek New Mexico and we collected contact information from 7th grade math and science teachers to include them on the AAUW Tech Trek NM Teacher Nomination email list. We are thankful again to have been chosen by Honeywell as one of the booths they pay for participating at the event and donate to a non-profit organization.
